Letter from the Manager

Dear Volunteers & Staff Leads,

This year has truly been incredible! Here's why:

- We saw an increase in volunteer engagement of over 7,000 hours from 2022 to 2023—that's a 39% increase in total volunteer engagement across the agency! This is particularly incredible given that the majority of organizations engaging volunteer support (65%) are still reporting decreased engagement with fewer hours, fewer opportunities and fewer new volunteers. (Volunteer Management Report; 2023)
- Volunteers gave us lots of great feedback on their volunteer experience with us in our Volunteer Opportunity
 Feedback Forms. To date, we have received 270 feedback forms with volunteers rating their experience at 4.83
 out of 5 stars!
- We offered several new volunteer opportunities in 2023 including two very popular opportunities: the Volunteer Courier, delivering interoffice mail and packages between parks each Wednesday, and the Market Custodial Support, performing light cleaning duties to help us maintain the 2nd Street Market.
- We have also expanded our opportunities to include more flexible, unscheduled opportunities when and where possible. We have several opportunities in Park Maintenance and Conservation for flexible service including: MetroParks Volunteer Patrol, Bat Box Monitor, Bluebird Monitor, and, new in 2023, Gardening Ambassador in the Maimon Memorial Garden at Cox Arboretum MetroPark. Additionally, we have offered several flexible behind-the-scenes Programming and Special Events preparation opportunities that volunteers can support from home, and short-term projects that could be completed by our administrative volunteers virtually.
- In addition to the development of new volunteer opportunities, we saw volunteer engagement at our
 ongoing opportunities grow exponentially. Carriage Hill MetroPark saw a 4-fold increase in volunteer
 engagement from 2022 bringing the historic farm back to life! We also saw increased engagement across
 our programs and special events, and an increase in group volunteer engagement with 36 community groups
 scheduled for workdays in our park!
- Plus, we introduced a brand-new volunteer incentive and appreciation item as part of our VIP Program- a long-sleeved volunteer shirt for volunteers with 75 hours or more with us.

We are so proud to share the data, pictures, and stories of this impact with you in this, our third edition of the Volunteer Impact Report. Much of this content was collected directly from our dedicated staff leads who lead and support our amazing volunteers in service throughout the year. While we cannot possibly fit everything into one report, we hope that you take pride in the information presented here knowing that you are an integral part of our conservation mission, and your efforts truly made a difference in 2023.

We are busy working with our staff leads across the agency to ensure another high-quality and meaningful volunteer season ahead. We hope you will join us again in volunteer service for 2024 as we continue to protect our region's natural heritage and provide outdoor experiences that inspire a personal connection with nature.


In 2023, volunteers served 25,624.35 hours in support of our parks, programs, and events for a dollar value of \$693,651.15 to the agency. This is a remarkable increase in volunteer engagement from 2022 when volunteers served 18,037.88 hours for a value of \$488,285.41, and an almost unbelievable recovery from the COVID pandemic years of 2020 and 2021 when volunteer engagement was drastically reduced.


Annual Volunteer Hours Comparison





Volunteer Responses by Primary Skill


Volunteer Hours by Volunteer Position







Volunteer Hours by MetroParks Location Comparison




Almost all park locations showed notable increases in volunteer engagement in 2023. Some parks doubled, tripled, or even quadrupled their volunteer engagement! This year's park with the most dedicated volunteer service was Carriage Hill MetroPark with close to 4x the volunteer engagement of 2022 and over 4,000 volunteer hours!

Volunteer Opportunities & Responses

We had 573 volunteer opportunities, many with a number of shifts (5,772 shifts) and over 18,000 available volunteer slots. We received over 8,766 volunteer opportunity responses in 2023.

Most volunteers are able to respond to opportunities the same day that they register and onboard with us as a new volunteer (1,379). Background checks are required every 3 years for adults 18 and over serving in long-term volunteer opportunities. These checks typically take just a few hours to complete, but can take up to 3 days.

Over 2,000 of our registered volunteers have responded to at least one opportunity on our site. Many more have responded to multiple opportunities. See the chart below.





Growing Volunteer Engagement Across Dayton

Get Connected is helping us ensure we are reaching every community in the Dayton area and indeed even the Miami Valley with the invitation to support our parks, programs, and events as a volunteer. Our reach is expanding, we are seeing an increasingly more diverse volunteer base develop. New volunteers are joining us from neighborhoods in North, West, East, and Downtown Dayton while we continue to nurture our established volunteer relationships with those volunteers coming to us from South of Dayton. Many of these volunteers began their journey with us at a service event: Adopt-A-Park, Make A Difference Day, or at a Service Saturday. Others came with a workgroup for a private group engagement or made a commitment to ongoing, long-term volunteer service. Some joined us as short-term youth volunteers completing service hours for school or other educational programs. With Get Connected anyone, anywhere can learn about our volunteer opportunities, onboard as a volunteer, and help out in ways that best fits their needs, schedules, and goals.




Public Volunteer Opportunities

With fewer projects identified by staff for fewer volunteers, we are seeing reduced engagement in our annual service events: Adopt-A-Park and Make A Difference Day.


We have; however, seen an increase in projects available and volunteer engagement at Service Saturdays. These public volunteer days are available on the third Saturday morning of each month from May through September across our parks as a great way for anyone and everyone to get outside, connect with nature, and give back to the parks they love.

We also continue to see an increase in engagement from a variety of community groups requesting private volunteer opportunities for their group. These volunteer workdays can be built based on the needs of our parks, the availability, interest, and abilities of the group interested. This is another great way for corporate groups, school groups, youth organizations, large families and more to get outside and give back together!

In 2023, 36 unique community groups with 618 volunteers served a total of 1,647 hours!

TOTAL VOLUNTEER IMPACT:

In 2023, in collaboration with their group, 618 volunteers contributed 1,647 volunteer service hours for a benefit to the agency of \$44,584.29. Additionally, supporting a variety of public service days and events, 47 teams of 174 volunteers contributed 1087.86 service hours for a benefit to the agency of \$29,448.37.



Adopt-A-Park

Adopt-A-Park: In-Person Projects

Staff hosted 22 Adopt-A-Park in person projects across 16 of our MetroParks: Adventure Central, Aullwood Garden, Carriage Hill, Cox Arboretum, Eastwood, Englewood, Germantown, Hills and Dales, Huffman-MoMBA, Possum Creek, RiverScape, Sugarcreek, Taylorsville, Wegerzyn Gardens, and Wesleyan MetroParks.

TOTAL VOLUNTEER IMPACT:

241 volunteers served in a variety of gardening and park maintenance tasks for a total of 617 hours.

- 252 lbs of landfill litter and debris was collected.
- 100 lbs of recyclable material was collected.
- 1 mile of rivers and lakes were cleaned.
- 1.35 miles of hiking, biking, and/or equestrian trail corridors were cleared.
- 3.7 acres of invasive plants were removed.
- 1 play/recreational areas were cleaned and maintained.
- 175 10-foot fence rails repaired.
- 759 trees and/or shrubs were planted.
- 100 flowers and/or bulbs were planted.

Adopt-A-Park: Service Kits

109 Adopt-A-Park Service Kits have been distributed. Each service kit comes with enough supplies for up to 5 individuals to support litter collection efforts in the community. Volunteers who registered for a service kit received email and written instructions on how to safely pick up and dispose of litter in our community, a list of targeted sites where litter collection is needed, and instructions for how to report back the details of their litter collection efforts: who helped, where, when, and how much was collected. As we receive these reports through the Spring, we will continue to compile data on the impact of the service kit effort.

2,235 lbs of litter was collected from these areas, along with several couches, assorted building supplies, a hubcap, window blind, shoes, shovel blade, and fishing lines. 55 youth volunteers and 35 adult volunteers participated in safe, independent litter collection for a total of 90 volunteers.

Make A Difference Day & Service Saturdays

Make A Difference Day

Through the combined efforts of 164 community volunteers across 19 projects, we were able to remove 325 pounds of landfill litter and 6 acres of invasive plants, clean and maintain 1 mile of rivers and lakes, and plant 170 trees and shrubs, and 2,000 flowers and bulbs.

Volunteers supported projects at the following locations: Adventure Central, Aullwood Garden, Carriage Hill, Cox Arboretum, Englewood, Germantown, Hills & Dales, Huffman, Possum Creek, RiverScape, Sugarcreek, Taylorsville, and Wegerzyn MetroParks, as well as on the Wolf Creek Bike Trail.

TOTAL VOLUNTEER IMPACT:

- 164 volunteers (90 youth, 74 adult)
- 490.56 hours served (270-youth, 220.56-adult)
- 325 pounds of landfill litter and debris were collected
- 845 pounds of recycling land litter and debris were collected
- 1 mile of rivers and lakes were cleaned
- 3 miles of hiking, biking, or equestrian trail corridor were cleaned
- 6 acres of invasive species were removed
- 170 trees and shrubs were planted
- 2,000 flowers and bulbs were planted
- 2 play/recreational areas were maintained
- 80 odd items were removed (picnic tables, irrigation piping, wood stakes, etc...)

164 volunteers contributed 490.56 service hours at Make a Difference Day for a benefit to the agency of \$13,279,45.

Service Saturdays

In 2023, we offered 7 Service Saturday projects engaging 99 volunteers served 302.56 hours in gardening, invasive species removal, and trail maintenance at several MetroParks locations: Cox Arboretum, MoMBA at Huffman, Possum Creek, Sugarcreek, Taylorsville, and Wegerzyn Gardens. Service Saturdays are public volunteer days when we encourage everyone to join us in the park for a morning of volunteer service that makes a difference. These public volunteer days are available on the third Saturday of each month May through September.

Our 9 Volunteer Positions help us organize and communicate all of the agency's varied volunteer opportunities to volunteers. These volunteer positions are organized based on the function and purpose served by the volunteer.



- Administrative volunteers work behind the volunteers have all they need to provide high-quality parks, programs, and services.
- Ambassador volunteers share their enthusiasm for Five Rivers MetroParks with diverse audiences at outreach booths, programs, and events throughout the Miami Valley.
- Animal Care volunteers support staff in caring for farm animals and wildlife animal ambassadors at a variety of our parks.
- Conservation volunteers are a part of our regional conservation story by assisting in implementing a variety of natural area management plans.
- Gardening volunteers support our horticulture and education staff in caring for a variety of gardens throughout our parks.
- Park Maintenance volunteers help to manage and sustain 18 beautiful parks, 11 conservation areas, and 160 miles of hike, bike, mountain bike, and horseback-riding trails for park visitors to safely enjoy.
- Programming volunteers work alongside staff to provide support at programs year-round that help participants master new skills, learn about the natural world, and appreciate the value of open spaces.
- Skilled Trades volunteers help drive our mission forward by assisting with maintenance projects in fabrication, repair, and interpretation.
- Special Event volunteers serve a critical role in ensuring that each special event or large-scale program runs smoothly from set-up to tear-down.

Volunteers can "Fan" their favorite volunteer positions in Get Connected to receive a weekly digest email with the latest opportunities and training offered under those volunteer positions.



Volunteer Couriers

This is a volunteer opportunity that we brought back to life this year after a several year hiatus brought on by the pandemic. Our Courier volunteers promote operational efficiency by driving designated north and south routes between park offices delivering packages, mail and other items on a weekly basis. Five volunteers were road vehicle trained and covered the weekly routes on a rotating schedule.



Administrative opportunities were an area of growth in 2023. Volunteers put their skills to good use by providing quality administrative support to MetroParks staff, which enhances the efficiency of our operations. 



Wildlife Ambassador Animal Care


Our wildlife animal care volunteers are a spectacular group of people. They are capable and dependable and compassionate. These animals are as healthy and well cared for as they are because of the dedication of these individuals.

Volunteers have given hundreds of hours to feeding our wildlife animal ambassadors: 416 night crawlers, 1,976 mice, 12lbs of fruits and veggies and, 650lbs of bird seed; cleaning bedding and washing dishes; and interacting with the animals.

They keep us all up to date on their condition. With their help both behind the scenes and presenting the animals, we have been able to give 224 hours of programming with our animal ambassadors that have reached approx. 6,688 people of all ages.



Bat Box Monitoring

Some bat species have drastically declined over the last few years due to the cumulative effects of habitat loss, wind energy development, and white-nose syndrome. In order to protect bats, it's important to know where they are roosting and understand how their population sizes are changing. Volunteers monitor bat boxes throughout Five Rivers MetroParks to determine the species of bat utilizing the box and the approximate size of the roosting populations. By tracking the difference in colony size across the season and across several years, we can start to understand where bats are living and how their populations are changing in our state. Here are the highlights from 2023:

- We added an additional box at Taylorsville for 2023
- We doubled the number of surveys for 2023
- 13 boxes, 78 hours of surveys, 12 volunteers
- 2 of 13 boxes were utilized by Big Brown Bats
- Everyone got to see bats at least flying around overhead and picked up some calls on the echo meter including some Seminole bat calls!




Conservation Highlights

Bluebird Monitoring

From 1920-1970, Eastern Bluebird populations plummeted throughout their entire range, estimates put the reduction to almost 90% of their total numbers. They became so rare, they were feared to soon become extinct. Negative impacts to their populations were driven mainly by nesting competition from non-native, invasive, cavity-nesting species (House

Sparrow and European Starling). Other compounding issues included habitat loss, pesticide use, snag (standing dead tree) removal, and rising populations of feral cats (i.e. free-roaming house cats) – another non-native species.



Five Rivers MetroParks has a wonderful, dedicated group of volunteers that work on their own schedule to monitor our boxes. Bluebird nest boxes are not nearly as successful at assisting with population growth/stability without consistent monitoring efforts. Having volunteers monitor and clean out the boxes throughout the breeding season is crucial to help with bluebird nesting success and for us to further understand and conserve bluebird populations. In 2023, we had at least one box at every single location show signs of bluebird activity! Eastern bluebirds displayed nesting attempts in a total of 65% of our 48 nest boxes at some point in the season with 40% of total boxes having contained bluebird eggs or hatched young. We had 13 bluebird monitoring volunteers this season covering 10 areas. They submitted a whopping 807 data sheet entries! Every box was surveyed several times each month from late-March – August. The timing of visits ensures we are able to get a useful amount of data without overly stressing the nesting birds.


Cover Mapping

Cover mapping is the scientific process of mapping vegetation types. Cover Mapping volunteers collect information about the tree species size, species composition as well as impacts from deer and invasive species to help Five Rivers MetroParks make land management decisions. These volunteers contributed over 865 hours to MetroParks in 2023!

Through their efforts, we potted species such as oaks, hickories, hazelnuts, buckeyes, rattle-snake master, persimmon, paw paw, rose mallow, blazing stars, and many others. Among the trees we tended to were blight resistant chestnut hybrids, a replacement for the American chestnuts that were wiped out by the chestnut blight during the first half of the twentieth century. We literally held a cure for the worst ecological disaster of the twentieth century in our hands. In addition, we assisted with the caterpillars of the Baltimore checkerspot butterfly, a rare species that is found only in high quality wetlands. To feed the caterpillars, we had to sterilize and water white turtlehead plants – the only host plant for the Baltimore checkerspot caterpillars. This paved the way for other volunteer groups, led by Girl Scout Shaylynn Weeber, to step in to reintroduce the Baltimore checkerspot, and its host plant, to Spring Run Conservation Area.

Scout Projects

Volunteer and local Girl Scout Shaylynn Weeber worked with our conservation team to plan a native planting project. Shaylynn and 27 volunteers planted 500 white turtlehead plugs at Spring Run Conservation Area. The plants will also help restore the wetland environment at Spring Run! Shaylynn completed this conservation project to earn her Girl Scout Gold Award.

Volunteers and local Boy Scouts Nick Weed and Christian Hartman worked with our Biologist to identify a need, and use their craftsman skills to build Turtle Nest Protectors to be used throughout MetroParks. These nest protectors will be placed over turtle nests to protect the eggs from predators and hopefully increase the populations of our native turtles. Both Weed and Hartman completed these projects to earn the rank of Eagle Scout.

Skilled Trades Highlights

Woodworking at Cox Arboretum

For more than 20 years, woodworking volunteers at Cox Arboretum MetroPark have used their skills to support the work of MetroParks staff. Building anything from bat boxes to benches, these volunteers meet once a week to work on projects, learn from each other and build camaraderie. While each woodworking volunteer must have a basic skill set, they all have a wide range of woodworking experience, from newer hobbyists to life-long contractors. "I've learned a lot since I joined," said volunteer Don Erwine. "Before I joined, I would do some repairs around the house, and I have an old pull barn that's always needing repairs, but I wasn't doing anything near what I'm able to do now." Recently, Erwine and his team of woodworkers - led by MetroParks park technician Uriah Langmeyer - completed their largest project to date: portions of the nature play at Cox Arboretum MetroPark.



Thank you, Woodworkers!

Cox Arboretum MetroPark's nature play opened in fall 2023. The woodworking volunteers constructed two bridges, a sloped climbing wall and the pergola - resulting in considerable time and cost savings. The group spent <u>850 hours</u> completing these structures, which would have otherwise been built - and billed - by contractors.

Langmeyer is especially proud of MetroParks' staff and the volunteers' accomplishments. Staff spent nearly 3,000 hours on the project, much of it working side-by-side with volunteers. "Teamwork makes the dream work," said Langmeyer, who values the woodworking team's collective learning experiences and process more than simply completing a project. "We're all learning together," he said. "Each person gets the chance to participate in everything that's going on. We problem solve together. We come up with ways do things by talking with everyone about it, and then evaluate the best approach." While building the nature play was, indeed, a challenging project, it also required a very collaborative approach. "On the pergola build for the nature play, volunteer Rex Miller was instrumental in getting the project finished," Erwine said. "The climbing wall was very meticulous, and volunteers Gary Drake and John Baldwin were phenomenal in getting that done because of their woodworking experience." With great challenges come great rewards: The woodworking volunteers and MetroParks staff are thrilled to see the community's reception to the project. "It's a wonderfully unique experience to be able to build a playground," Langmeyer said, "then get to watch kids of all ages enjoy it every day you go to work."

The Nature play features structures created from natural materials that encourage kids to explore nature and connect to the natural world. John Kennedy elementary was the first school group to enjoy this new feature just as it was opening to the public. The students were excited by the new feature, and one was having so much fun, she shared with her teacher that "this is so much better than the playgrounds at school."


